



NOWPDP launched the Saheli project with the objective to identify women with disabilities who are community leaders, working professionals and influencers and utilize them to engage other women with disabilities through field outreach, events, activities and sessions. These Sahelis will primarily be responsible to counsel and mentor women with disabilities and their parents and understand their issues and challenges while acting as their focal persons in order to create an environment where women with disabilities feel safe and confident enough to seek employment opportunities, become financially independent and economically empowered.



It is primarily a women economic empowerment project funded by FCDO with British Asian Trust as their implementing partner. NOWPDP is amongst the 6 partners in Pakistan working under the livelihood ambit of this grant.

REHNUMAI (GUIDANCE)

Rehnumai means guidance, to facilitate a person with disability in receiving the right accommodations to achieve independence. This can be done through giving the right information, helping them acquire the right assistive device or training, and leading them towards a sustainable source of employment for their economic wellbeing.

NOWPDP emphasizes on strong community outreach and building for this pillar where persons with disabilities are reached out to and facilitated in accordance with their needs. This year, the focus of the efforts for Rehnumai have been on community engagement though out all locations in Karachi, Islamabad and Sujawal. Various consultations, panels and disability specific innovative and inclusive activities were the tools used to create impact and further the mandate.

Limitless Potential

Education is a crucial component in every individual's life especially those living with a disability as it is a stepping stone in their professional lives. However, acquiring education is not all rosy for people with disabilities as communication barriers, lack of acceptance in society, general misinformation and unawareness, and most commonly protective parents can withhold a child's right to education.

Ayesha Bina, enrolled in the computer operator training, was unfortunately in the same boat. Due to the rising inflation, her parents wouldn't allow her to enroll in a bachelor's degree. Since Ayesha was very passionate about learning, the Rehnumai team intervened, providing counselling to her parents, and within days her parents took her for admission to a college of her choice.

It is instances like these that serve as a true reminder of how support and guidance can transform the lives of persons with disabilities.

SHANAKHT (IDENTITY)

NOWPDP conducts Special CNIC Camps which are a one-window operation designed such that all relevant governmental departments come under one roof. This reduces the process of a person with a disability acquiring a Disability Certificate and/or a Special CNIC from twelve weeks to two days.

These Special CNICs hold great benefits and facilities for persons with disabilities. NOWPDP has been successfully conducting these camps with the crucial and unwavering support of Nadra and the Government of Sindh.

My disability was acquired in 2002 when I had a shunt-pass, which affected my eyes. Then, in 2018, my legs developed a disability too as a side effect. So I required a SCNIC which was a very difficult task for me. The doctors I went to didn't recognize the extent of my disability. They said I had only 15% disability when you needed 35% to get a disability certificate. I even tried to get a fitness certificate, but that was rejected too. After facing multiple rejections, things started looking up when NOWPDP organized a one-window SCNIC camp. Finally, I was able to get my disability certificate SCNIC there.

ONE WINDOW SCNIC CAMP

Under the banner of Shanakht, NOWPDP conducts one-window Special CNIC (SCNIC) camps. The aim is to facilitate persons with disabilities in the process of attaining their SCNIC in one day as opposed to 10-12 weeks. Following are the steps that take place during the camp.



Unlocking Possibilities

In the shadows of Maaj Goth, Sakina Bibi confronted adversity, bereft after her mother's demise and her father's frailty. Trapped in a cycle of poverty due to her disability, Sakina relied solely on her sister's support, abandoned by her husband. A lifeline appeared through NOWPDP, granting her an SCNIC at the one-window camp.

This small card became her ticket to hope. Registering under the Benazir Income Support Program (BISP), Sakina found a lifeline to escape despair. The newfound support offered not just financial aid but a chance at a brighter existence, a testament to the transformative power of compassion and assistance

FALAH (WELFARE)

Under NOWPDP's pillar of Falah, persons with disabilities are facilitated to achieve mobility, welfare, and immediate assistance. They are provided with wheelchairs, hearing aids, rations, and clean drinking water with the intent of catering to their fundamental rights.

A primary healthcare clinic has been set up at Moriro Markaz, Sujawal, in collaboration with Shine Humanity and the Aziz and Razia Dharamsey Family Foundation. Through the clinic, persons with and without disabilities are now able to achieve medical assistance in the heart of Sindh.

NOWPDP has also been greatly supported by the Sindh Government, DEPD, and Social Welfare Departments in distributing wheelchairs all over Pakistan. The wheelchairs have been generously funded by Doctors Worldwide, Dil Foundation and the Wheelchair Foundation.

Acquiring a disability at the tender age of 8 due to a fall from the roof, Sher Bano faced a life confined within her home as her parents couldn't afford the necessary surgeries. This led to missing out on family gatherings, funerals, and weddings, fostering feelings of hopelessness and helplessness. However, the Moriro Markaz team emerged as a beacon of hope in her life. The wheelchair provided by the team became a catalyst for her social inclusion, enabling her to actively participate in family events. No longer confined by physical limitations and lack of decision making , she now feels like an integral part of her family gatherings, breaking free from the isolation that once consumed her.

The teachers at The Inclusion Academy pushed Ahmed to come out of his shell and so Ahmed began to show his true colors. His sharp memory helped him grasp sign language fast to be able to communicate with fellow students and teachers, leaving behind the timid Ahmed that first stepped into The Inclusion Academy.

Ahmed has expressed his aspiration to serve in the Pakistan Army as a dedicated soldier. After successfully completing the kindergarten level, Ahmed has transitioned to Deaf Reach to continue his educational journey.

THE INCLUSION ACADEMY

The Inclusion Academy is a model integrated education set up for children with and without disabilities. As a pilot project, The Inclusion Academy dictates an exemplary way forward of how special education in Pakistan could be both inclusive and effective.


A Shining Star

HUNAR (SKILLS DEVELOPMENT)

The pillar of Hunar at NOWPDP works for the skills development of persons with disabilities for an economically empowered future. Hunar has been instrumental in imparting practical knowledge to persons with disabilities by training them in the technical skills across sectors ranging from print making, dry processing, domestic and industrial stitching.

Moreover, under the banner of Hunar, persons with disabilities are equipped with information technology and financial literacy skills through training in data entry and call-center operations. Keeping in line with the State Bank's policy of financial inclusion, NOWPDP also trains persons with disabilities to be an active part of the banking sector.







New Trades

This year, NOWPDP started three new trades in the pillar of Hunar: Skill Enrichment training for persons with intellectual disabilities, Basic Literacy and English Language training, as an up skilling trade, for adults with disabilities.



Parwaaz Project

Parwaaz is an initiative of NOWPDP, in collaboration with Inditex, Kings Apparel, Artistic Apparels (Pvt.) Ltd, and Digital Apparel, to economically empower persons with hearing & speech disabilities in the textile sector.

50+ persons with disabilities have been trained in the Stitching Trainings conducted at the Moriro Markaz Training Center in Sujawal, sponsored by multiple organizations such as the British Asian Trust, Mondelez, Hilton Pharma and many more.



When forms were placed in front of me, I would be completely blank, not knowing what to do. I required assistance from others around me and would always hesitate to ask-embarrassed that a supposedly simple task was evidently a hurdle for me. I then found out about NOWPDP through my friends and enrolled in basic literacy training. For the first time in my life, I didn't require assistance and signed my own form rather than just giving a thumbprint. I can now also type on the computer which has allowed me to fill out the information on digital forms. The training gave me agency in life that I had only ever dreamed of.




Breaking Barriers

ROZGAR (EMPLOYMENT)

NOWPDP has been engaged in a two-pronged strategy for economic empowerment that works through its pillar of Rozgar.

Recruitment of persons with disabilities involves the outreach of candidates, their career development, and their employment as well as the capacity building of organizations. The capacity building of all organizations covers both persons with disabilities as employees & consumers. Rozgar works with persons with disabilities in assessing their skill set and matching them to their respective career opportunities.

Other than employment opportunities for persons with disabilities, Rozgar also provides numerous services like sensitizations, disability champions, breathing books, facility and policy audits & sign language training for employers as their capacity building to better integrate persons with disabilities in the work environment.

The program equipped me with essential skills and led me to secure a job at Digital Apparel. Today, I am proud to say that I am able to provide a stable income for my household.

NOWPDP understands the need for innovative interventions for the economic empowerment of persons with disabilities. When a person with disability doesn't have the right opportunity for education or employment, other creative initiatives can also help increase the chance of earning a livelihood. The Rickshaw Project is one of the oldest projects of NOWPDP and a main facet of KhudMukhtari. Each rickshaw is retrofitted and given to trained drivers with disabilities to earn an independent livelihood.

In addition, the pillar of KhudMukhtari also aims to increase access to the acquisition of microfinance loans.


Stitching Through Adversity




I learn something new from my colleagues every day, and the environment has provided me with immense exposure and confidence for leadership in the development sector.




