





With a relentless commitment to creating an equitable society, the centers of engagement are reshaping the narrative for PWDs, creating a future where everyone has the chance to thrive.



Rehnumai aims to empower persons with disabilities by ensuring they receive the appropriate accommodations to foster independence. NOWPDP's Rehnumai initiative focused on community engagement across Karachi, Islamabad, and Sujawal.

Through consultations, panels, and inclusive activities, the program aimed to empower persons with disabilities by providing vital information on their rights, access to assistive devices, and opportunities for economic independence. Efforts included sessions on BISP and the national census, as well as partnerships with organizations like WHO and local government bodies to expand reach and create a more inclusive environment.

NOWPDP organizes Special CNIC Camps, a streamlined one-window operation that brings all relevant governmental departments together under one roof. This initiative significantly reduces the time required for PWDs to obtain a Disability Certificate and/or an SCNIC, from up to 12 weeks to just 2 days.

These Special CNICs hold significant benefits for persons with disabilities. NOWPDP has been successfully running these camps with the essential and steadfast support of NADRA, DEPD, and the Government of Sindh.




In Karachi's Machar Colony, Bengali fishermen and their families face severe poverty and exclusion due to their undocumented status, despite many being born in Pakistan. Recognizing this challenge, the NOWPDP's Shanakht team and Imkaan Trust have joined forces to help residents secure identity cards. ONE WINDOW SCNIC CAMP

Under the banner of Shanakht, NOWPDP conducts one-window Special CNIC (SCNIC) camps. The aim is to facilitate persons with disabilities in the process of attaining their SCNIC in one day as opposed to 10-12 weeks. Following are the steps that take place during the camp.



STEP 01

Registration at the Special CNIC Camp



STEP 02

Issuance of disability certificates by SPDPA



STEP 03

Hearing tests are conducted



STEP 04

Disability assesment by Department of Health



STEP 05

Signature & verification by Medical Superintendent



Transforming Dreams into Reality

Jamil Hassan, a determined individual from Gilgit with a hearing and speech disability, faced lifelong discrimination and financial challenges, compounded by the lack of a Special CNIC to validate his rights. Despite interning at reputable organizations, he struggled to access his stipend, remaining marginalized and without official recognition.

NOWPDP's SCNIC intervention became a turning point, enabling Jamil to secure a Special CNIC, access financial services, and pursue his aspirations. He enrolled in a Computer Operator training program and an English Language course, fostering his personal and professional development. Jamil's story showcases the resilience of persons with disabilities and the transformative power of targeted support in breaking barriers and realizing dreams.

NOWPDP's Falah pillar supports persons with disabilities by providing assistive devices like wheelchairs and hearing aids, as well as essential resources such as rations and clean drinking water. A primary healthcare clinic at Moriro Markaz in Sujawal, in collaboration with Shine Humanity and the Aziz and Razia Dharamsey Family Foundation, offers medical assistance to all.

With support from the Sindh Government, DEPD, and Social Welfare Departments, NOWPDP distributes wheelchairs nationwide, funded by Doctors Worldwide, Dil Foundation, and the Wheelchair Foundation. These efforts aim to improve accessibility and welfare for persons with disabilities across Pakistan.



Compassion in Action

Life took a harsh turn for 11-year-old Sakina from Machar Colony when meningitis left her with cerebral palsy. Sakina's family, struggling financially, couldn't provide the medical care or wheelchair she needed, leaving her with limited mobility and an inadequate diet. Her situation changed when NOWPDP's outreach team registered her case, bringing hope and support.

Upon registration by the outreach team, Team Falah worked to improve Sakina's life by providing a specially designed CP wheelchair, enhancing her mobility. They also arranged for her to be assessed by a nutritionist at Shine Humanity, who created a tailored meal plan. The combination of mobility and proper nutrition not only enhanced her physical health but also filled her family with hope and possibilities. Her story highlights the transformative power of compassion, timely intervention, and resilience.





From Basic Literacy to Higher Education


Embracing Inclusivity

After my internship, I was offered a full-time position as an assistant, and now, three years later, I still feel fulfilled by the positive impact we create.





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
